What is the "Duet Bike"? It was developed 20 years ago and is built to accommodate a 'driver' and a passenger, regardless of size or age.

The duet bike ensures that no one misses out on the freedom, confidence and therapeutic benefits that come with bike riding.

Riding an adaptive bike provides

valuable therapeutic benefits and a sense of inclusion where anyone can ride a bike with their family and friends. Resident bicycle rides can be taken along nature trails for a lovely view providing fresh air and promoting resident health and well-being. The bike allows wheelchair bound residents in our Long Term Care Centre to ride in a specially designed bicycle along with another person. Residents can take advantage of the therapeutic exercise, a bike ride and get out into the community in ways that they would not otherwise be able to access. The residents have responded extremely well to the "Duet Bike".
